How can effective editing help you? Below are two versions of the Statement of Purpose. The question the student is addressing is: Why are you interested in studying at XXXX? Describe your career objectives, and explain how graduate study at XXXX will help you achieve your professional goals. (Why Grad School? Why here? Why now?)

AFTER REVIEWING BOTH OF THESE I AM CERTAIN YOU WILL SEE HOW YOURDEAN.COM'S EDITING CAN ASSIST YOU WITH YOUR GRADUATE SCHOOL STATEMENTS OF PURPOSE.

Version 2 – If you look at this essay, even before you read it, you will see what a thorough and complete editing/revision your paper would receive. This is the kind of scrutiny a professional gives a statement of purpose that is different from what your roommate is likely to provide.

The second version of the paper, which you should read first, is different in two significant ways: the opening paragraph is entirely different from the first version and this draft is nearly 20% shorter. If you scroll down to it you will see how cutting and pasting and deleting superfluous words can change a Statement of Purpose. The opening of the second version is one that an admissions committee would notice and remember. The concise and focused style of the second paper suggests that this student knows how to focus his writing and argue effectively.

Version 1 -- The original first draft of the Statement of Purpose is clear and for the most part well written. Its opening is to the point but unremarkable. The student has an excellent grasp of the curriculum at the school and knows precisely what he wants to do and why he wants to attend this program.
